

Results: North American Sprint CW — September 2010

Welcome to yet another CW Sprint results writeup. This is the latest of 67 that have been written over the past 30-odd years. Yes, this is the original Sprint, not some cheap imitation.

Perhaps you have heard that the CW Sprint is the best test of an operator's ability. Certainly it is one contest where cluster spotting really can't be used, because the contest is going at Indy 500 speeds, and by the time you learn that some juicy multiplier is on a certain frequency, two other people have already made contacts on that frequency. This is the contest in which such legendary operators as N5TJ, W4AN/KM9P, N2IC, K5ZD, N5RZ and N6TR established themselves. This contest is one that greatly rewards those who can tune to a frequency, quickly determine what is going on and make snap decisions about what action to take.

Making the Top 10 in this contest means more to most contesters than in any other event. Perhaps the only other contest where making the Top 10 means as much would be the ARRL November Sweepstakes. Many of the well-known top finishers in all contests have placed in the Top 10 in this event 30 or more times. This possibility is something open to all areas of the US; even stations in the Midwest "Black Hole" or in the Northeast make regular appearances in the Top 10.

Are you perhaps more focused on low power or QRP? There is no better place to demonstrate your operating ability while competing against great operators running the same power you are.

Perhaps you would like to put together a team of operators from your local area and make a splash. This contest was the pioneer in team competition.

All of this is probably why the CW Sprint remains on the list of qualifying events for the WRTC events. While some might find the CW speeds dizzying, you can meet the contest on your own terms by operating above the fray and calling CQ at your own comfortable speed. Chances are that someone else who is in the same boat as you will respond. Failing that, perhaps one of the speed demons will find the QRS button and work you for a new one — and then take your frequency.

The latest running of the CW Sprint took place September 12, 2010 UTC. Conditions overall seemed better than average for a September Sprint. Most stations were able to enjoy good propagation on 20 and 80 meters and excellent propagation on

40 meters. In fact, stations in all 10 US call areas and Canada reported at least 90 QSOs on each of the three bands.

Activity was down by about 25 percent from the February running, however, with only 226 active stations. This meant QRM levels were not as intense, and scores were down slightly. Nonetheless, the Top 10 represented scores made from all around the country.

QRP

We came up one log short of filling up the Top 10 box with QRP stations. Once again, that guy with some extra letters on the end of his call sign, KA9FOX, came out on top with a QSO total of 221. This is five more than Scott had last February. Doug, K1DG, operated his N1LI station in Maine and came close to Scott's score with 213 QSOs. Mork, K6UFO represented the West Coast with 214 QSOs but came in third due to missing one more multiplier than N1LI. Mork credited the NCCC Thursday night Sprint practices for his score improvement.

Speaking of improvement, Ken, N2ZN, had just 13 QSOs in February but ended up with 167 QSOs this time. That was enough to beat QRP Sprint veteran Doug, KR2Q, in the W2 district, who had 148. Brian, NA4BW, had 140 QSOs, showing that the competition in this category is pretty thick. Paul, AA4XX, contributed the seventh QRP entry of more than 100 QSOs. KE0G and NB4M finished out the "Top Nine" listing. Congratulations to all of these fine operators, who dared to enter into battle armed only with 5 W.

Low Power

Steve, N9CK, won the Low Power category for the sixth consecutive time. It was not easy this time, however. Just 300 points behind was Don, W4OC. Pat, NA0N, was also close, and all three of these operators topped 12,000 points. W4OC employed only one radio, and his score actually qualified as the 11th highest single-radio score regardless of power category. Bob, KU5B, and Al, K0AD, finished next in a photo finish, with less than one QSO difference in their scores.

Yuri, VE3DZ was only two QSOs behind in sixth place. K9YC/6, WQ5L and N0AT all had scores greater than 11,000 points, with K9MMS finishing 10th with 235 QSOs. The competition in the Low Power category continues to be just as tight as among the High Power entrants. Who will be the lucky one to finally end N9CK's winning streak?

High Power

Once again, Trey, N5KO, and Dan, N6MJ, battled it out for the top spot. Dan won the QSO battle with nine more contacts than Trey, but it wasn't enough to overcome Trey's three multiplier advantage. Strong work by Trey this time backed up his first victory last February. Third place went to Tyree, N6TR/7, who just edged out Andy, N2NT, by dint of the log checking process.

The only Top 10 score from Texas was submitted by Jim, N3BB/5, who came in fifth, followed by another California score from Bob, N6TV. Tor, N4OGW, came in seventh, and Bud, AA3B, finally cracked the Top 10 for the first time ever, finishing in eighth place. A couple of W9s finished out the Top 10: W9RE and N9RV (really a W7 now that he's moved to Montana). Now that Pat has his big antennas up, you will be hearing a big noise in many contests from that part of the US.

Team Competition

The Ad Hoc team did not post any of the top handful of scores but showed a lot of strength in the bottom half of their scores to beat the Northern California Contest Club #1 team by more than 10,000 points. The Austin Dashers came in third, and the Southern California Contest Club placed fourth. There were 16 teams registered, which is still down a bit from historical averages.

Putting together a team is the best way to encourage activity and support the contest. The process to register a team is easy. Just visit the NCJ Web site, www.ncjweb.com, click on "Contests" and then look for the team registration link down on the left side of the page.

Golden Logs

Only eight logs achieved Golden Log status, with no deductions during log checking. Congratulations to John, N2NC, the only station on the list posting more than over 300 QSOs. Doug, N1LI, made the list with 213 QRP QSOs followed by a part time effort from N2IC with 114 contacts. K7KU, N2NL, K3UA, KA3DRR and PY4XX were the other golden entries.

Records

Doug, K1DG, piloted his N1LI station to the first QRP score submitted from Maine. Ken, N2ZN, greatly improved upon his QRP record from New York that he set just last February. Doug, KR2Q, also improved on his New Jersey QRP record. Ray, WQ5L, pushed up his Mississippi Low

Power record by six points. Mork, K6UFO, erased the eight-year-old QRP record for California that had belonged to K6III. Pat, N9RV, posted a new High Power record for Montana. Scott, KA9FOX, improved on his previous QRP record from Wisconsin by adding exactly two multipliers to his previous score. Yuri, VE3DZ, improved his Low Power record for Ontario.

A few DX entries from countries that never were represented finished out the new ink in the record books, Fred, K9VV, operated NP2X, Dave, N2NL, operated from his new KH2 location and Iliya, LZ4UU, piloted LZ5X for the first score from Bulgaria — and a pretty impressive one at that with 125 QSOs.

Next Time

The next CW Sprint will be held February 6, 2011 UTC (Saturday, February 5, local time in North America). The starting time

is 0000 UTC, and you may operate for the 240 minutes from 0000 to 0359 inclusive.

For team registration, use the NCJWeb page, www.ncjweb.com. Submit your logs via e-mail to cwsprint@kkn.net or use the log submission form on the NCJWeb site. *Logs are due seven days after the contest!* Final scores are typically posted within two weeks of the contest and are announced on the CQ-Contest reflector and posted on

the NCJWeb page.
