# Results, August 1995 SSB North American QSO Party

This running of the NAQP SSB contest was quieter than usual, mainly because the Sultans of Shwing were off helping Scott, KA9FOX, get married. There was a team entry for Fox's Wedding Party (nee Sultans), but only NØAXL showed up to operate the contest. This put a very large dent in the otherwise staunch showing from the Black Hole. Usually the guys from W9-land are out in force—this time it was the W5 call area that really came through. Quite a few commented on the poor conditions and the hard work involved in a mid-summer contest during the sunspot minimum.

George Schultz, WØUA, a veteran Sweepstakes winner, won this year's August running of the NAQP SSB in the single-op category. We're glad to see George, and hope he will return in January to liven things up again.

There was quite a lot of multioperator competition this time. WA5DWX had a group of 13 first-time contesters and did very well indeed—this was a very interesting and commendable exercise Billy put on to promote contesting among hams who had never done it before.

Team-wise, the Texans from TACO won first place, followed by SCCC #1, the TDXS #1 and the Florida Contest Group, represented only by AC10/4, who scored enough by himself to take fourth in team competition. Generally speaking, team competition was down in proportion to overall participation.

Our apologies to the following people whose January 95 NAQP SSB logs were lost in the dreaded mail mix-up at N4TQO's. K1VUT in Massachusetts would have placed second in the W1 call area with a score of 60,500 points; AB5SE was the Arkansas winnter with 82,164 points; and NAQP regular K4BAI scored 38,081 points from the state of Georgia. #### **AB6FO Goes Native**

This trip came about when my wife and her sister decided our families should take a joint summer vacation. To interest her 17-year-old son, my sister-in-law chose St Martin. She also chose the dates. When I looked at the contest calendar, I saw that NAQP Phone fit the bill! In a very neat usage of the Internet, I got the name of the Hotel Chatelaine (which sports an A3S and HF2V) from Scott, KA9FOX, and looked at pictures of the place on his Web site. The rest was easy

"Papa Japan Seven Stroke Alpha Bravo Six Foxtrot Oscar" is a mouthful, but the Landsradio office wouldn't issue a PJ7 call since the NAQP is not a "major contest." Bummer. But not as much of a bummer as my plugging my TS-950 into what I thought was a 100-V outlet, only to find with a flash of light it was 220 V. The names I called myself couldn't be said on the air. Fortunately, my brother-in-law had a 10-amp fuse, so I was back in business.

I couldn't get anything going in the first hour, even with the PJ7 prefix. In the second and most of the third hour, I made up my own contest and ran Europe. No mults but plenty of points. Getting the names slowed me down to an 88 rate. That was my first experience with a phone pileup and I have a newfound respect for DXpeditioners.

15 meters opened for the 2100 hour and the rate hit 98. Alas, 10 never opened. I finally found a spot in the 2300 hour on 20 and had a good run, with a rate of 104. In the middle of the run I had a disconcerting experience. I was on 14244.8 when a guy came on and told me that I was interfering with a DX net on 14247. Now I'm 2000 miles away, running 150 W into an A3S at 20 feet, and 2.2 kHz away from his frequency. He is the loudest signal on the band, obviously running full power. The band is jam-packed and I finally have a run frequency. What do I do? I decided to tell him I was 2.2 kHz away and he should use his filters. Boy, did I get harangued. If I had been only 1 kHz away, well, that would be different.

Then I took my first break at 0000Z and couldn't do anything the rest of the contest. Don't ever complain about 40-meter phone until you try to work it from the Caribbean. Ouch! I did have a 10-minute run on 40 before a broadcast station opened up on me.—73, Ken, PJ7/AB6FO
