Results of the 30th North American CW Sprint

The Midwest was well represented in the 30th running of the North American Sprint, thanks to the efforts of Dave Patton, WX3N (then AA9AK), and the Society of Midwest Contesters, who put five teams on the air. Ralph Bellas, K9ZO, raised the concern, "I'm not sure that having so many midwest stations active helped or hindered us, but it was great to hear the activity." Who cares? Organizing a massive amount of activity from the midwest really did nothing for the event. Not!

Five ops from states in the heart of the Black Hole bid "73" to state records in South Dakota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois and Indiana. The added Midwestern activity sent ripples into other parts of the country, making scores higher. A record total of 70 stations reached the 10,000 point plateau. Because of the Midwest caper, 160 logs were submitted this time. That's a lot of activity. In fact, 332 different call signs were logged by top ten scorers in the event.

Perhaps this explains how it is possible for Jeff Steinman, KRØY/5, to finish with 375 QSOs. Jeff has now won the contest enough times that the contest committee has voted to change the event's name from The North American Sprint to "Jeff's World." Not!

Dave McCarty, K5GN, showed up in second place with big numbers and Trey Garlough, WN4KKN/6, placed third with a nice effort from the West Coast.

In the team competition, the Southern California Contest Club #1 team finished champs once again, but their 132,304 points fell just shy of the team record of 134,084 set by the independent Blues Brothers team of a few years back. Finishing in a strong second was the Northern California Contest Club #1 group, also with a mostly local group.

A lot of people have asked about the log checking. Here's some of what happens: When your log arrives, it is given a line-by-line visual inspection for obvious errors, such as N2BA's name recorded as Sal rather than Hal, or someone working N5RZ in the last five minutes and copying his number as #37. Then the claimed scores are entered into the computer. Once the log deadline arrives, the top 15 or 20 logs plus a few for spot checking are keyed into the computer. Then this information in munged into log extracts for the 350 or so people who were on the bands. A side-by-side comparison is done between the computer-generated logs and the submitted logs. Then all the errors

and penalties are tabulated and the final info is keyed into the computer for processing.

After all of the mechanical checks are complete, the logs are looked at for "reasonableness." That's a log checker's term for instinctively sniffing out problems. The bottom line is that if you think your score puts you in the top 20, send a disk. Your log will be added to the computer data base. Some people always do well and send disks: KRØY, N6AA and N5RZ immediately come to mind. Some people always do well and they refuse to submit disks. Even if you do the contest on paper and your post-processing ritual involves typing call signs and band data into a machine, send the data. It is useful, especially if you are one of the top 20 guys.

One final comment about log checking: Sending a floppy diskette with your log does not put you at a log checking disadvantage in this contest; never has, never will. The committee is smart enough not to permit that to happen. Many thanks to the committee members who spent their personal time doing data entry. (Yuck!) Your assistance is greatly appreciated.

The September event is scheduled for the 5th, local time. Hope to see you there.
