

Final Results: North American Sprint CW [February 2024]

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(These are the final results and include the Top Ten scores from all categories and overlays. This is the complete results article. A summary article will be included in an upcoming issue of NCJ.)

Great conditions on all bands. Time flew by. — W9RE Managed to stay awake. — W2RQ

Morse Code Flash Mob

Whether the start of CW Sprint causes you to hit DEFCON 1 or the snooze alarm, promptly at 0000Z on February 5th, CW Skimmers worldwide started showing completely useless information about 260 stations who were briskly calling CQ but then rapidly vacating their run frequencies. Yes, the 94th running of the CW North American Sprint was underway!

We received 188 logs this go-round, a 17% increase over the past two CW Sprints. Conditions were great and multipliers were as abundant as cutaways to Taylor Swift during the Super Bowl. Both Kirk K4RO and Pat N9RV tied the multiplier record of 56 and 5 other ops hit 55.

That turnout was 30% higher than the previous two Sprints, but there is still room to grow as the all-time record is 227 logs sent in. Higher turnout (260 total overall calls) combined with an open 20 meter band and a quiet 80 meters to produce four hours of fun – the overall number of QSOs was 25% higher than in September.

Record Wreckage

Despite the higher turnout, no individual overall scoring records were broken. Kirk K4RO did join the tie for all-time highest multiplier count of 56. The FRC Domestic team displaced NCCC#1 as the team score record holder in the "modern" era (5 ops per team), with a total that averaged over 17K per op. Tree N6TR came in with the highest number of accurately copied exchanges ever, turning in a record setting Golden Log bulging with 371 contacts having no mistakes. Several state and province records were broken. The new record holders mostly replaced their old scores except as indicated:



On the DX side, from one of the rarer North American countries, KO8SCA broke W2TO's 28-year-old High Power record from 4U1UN (see the comments and photos from Adrian later in this article) and Phil KT3Y upped his own record from KP2. From a tad further away, RAØLQ broke RU1SN's UA9 High Power record in the Non-North American group.

Band-by-Band

On the band change front, in aggregate the herd decided to spend 1:15 on 20 meters, 1:35 on 40 meters, and 1:10 on 80 meters. While conditions were excellent on 80, the transition there probably happened too soon, as the overall QSO rate drooped for the last 20 minutes.



A look at the data suggests that staying on 20 meters for 10 minutes longer, and 80 for a few minutes less would have optimized the mix.

The Finish Line

High Power

The Sprint is always great! The inaugural contest for the new 40m 4sq. Paired with a NE/SW dipole on a push up mast through a stack match it worked really well. Still struggling to get the big mult totals in this one. Of course struggling to get the big QSO totals also. Lots of work to get the station ready for this contest. Congrats to the high scorers! — Chris KM7W (KL9A)

This was a squeaker of a Sprint — the top five were separated by less than 825 points, or just 4.1%. Andy N2NT made it two in a row, coming in first to get his 5th Sprint win. edging out Tree N6TR by just 96 points. Andy came out of the gate fast with a 117-QSO hour, using that and a 1 multiplier lead to overcome Tree's 5 QSO advantage.

Pat N9RV came in third, propelled by 56 mults (tied with K4RO for most mults) but was doomed by only 70 Qs in the third hour. Even though he barely touched his bandswitch, Dan N6MJ took fourth from within the Classic category, just 1 QSO and 1 mult behind Pat. Bob (Mr. K4) N6TV rounded out the top five, losing his 10-QSO lead over Dan in the final hour, ending up behind by just 1 QSO.

Kirk K4RO, Bud AA3B, Trey N5KO, Steve N2IC, and Tor N4OGW rounded out the top ten. Curiously, the entire top 5 and 8 of the top ten calls started with N, with only K4RO and AA3B breaking the pattern. I see Kenny N5EE's email filling up with Sprint guest op requests...

High Power - Classic

(The Classic listings refer to logs with a maximum of 12 band changes. – Ed.)

In addition to his 4th place overall finish, for the second consecutive Sprint Dan N6MJ once again went old school and came in first in the High Power Classic competition. Steve N2IC was 5 QSOs and 3 mults behind Dan to take second place. Andy N2NL came in third, hampered by a slow third hour but his strong first hour kept him ahead of 4th place finisher John N2NC.

There was a tight battle for 5th place between the YCCC/WWROF twins, Doug K1DG and John K1AR. Ultimately Doug prevailed by 1 QSO, taking advantage of John's slow middle hours. Tim K3LR, Bill W2RQ, Gator N5RZ, and Dave K6LL filled out the rest of this top ten.

Ken KØEU and Pat NAØN fought a close battle, with Ken coming in first by just 323 points after Pat gave away too many QSOs in the last hour to overcome Ken's 3-mult advantage. Lar K7SV took third, just a few hundred points back, while Ray WQ5L and Jim W8WTS filled out the top five. Hal W1NN, Ron NØAT and Joe N8EA took the next three spots, with only 4 QSOs and 1 mult separating their scores. "Bugs" K7SS and Dave N4DW came in 9th and 10th.

Low Power - Classic

Lar K7SV was a clear winner in the Low Power Classic category, using a 34 Q and 2 mult advantage to triumph over second place finisher Ray WQ5L. Ray moved up from his previous third place showing in the category, which this time was claimed by Hal W1NN. Ron NØAT used a 2-QSO advantage to take 4th place, relegating Joe N8EA to 5th. Of note is sixth place finisher "Bugs" K7SS whose distinctive fist made him easy to identify but a bit harder to copy. This category also wins the Prefix Diversity Award, with as many Ws in the top ten as Ns!

Once again, we had 7 operators brave enough to turn it down to QRP in a Sprint. NN7SS won the competition with 7,172 points, followed by Mike K8CN in second. A quartet of 6-Land calls (though two of them were actually in AZ) took the next four spots: John KE6K, Ron WQ6X, John N6HI, and Rex N6AN. Mike W7LG filled in the final spot in the QRP scores.

Team Competition

Reflecting the increased activity level, the top seven teams all came in above 70,000 points. FRC Domestic's record setting 85,936-point effort delegated NCCC#1 to second place with 83,621, breaking their string of recent wins. SCCC#1 settled for third at 75,559 the Zoomers teleported into fourth with 75,112, and the SE Sprint Coalition's 74,234 coalesced into 5th place. Overall, twenty-four teams were registered, a slight uptick from September.

In case you were wondering, there were 12,660 QSOs made on 20 meters, 14,412 on 40 meters, and 9,116 on 80 meters. The total of 36,188 QSOs was 7,291 more than in the September contest. If the bands felt more crowded than usual, they were!

The single-band QSO winners were:

20 meters: N6TR 14040 meters: N5KO 14280 meters: W2RQ 117

With 56 being the top multiplier count, that would make the maximum possible score $399 \times 56 = 22,344$, higher than the all-time top score!

Golden Logs

My try for a Golden Log ended early when I copied Dan K7SS as Buzz instead of Bugs. Tree N6TR had no problem decoding bug-send and had a record setting 371-QSO clean sheet, while Dan N6MJ was next with 352 accurate entries. Ray WQ5L edged aurora-piercing Steve KL7SB for third and Ned K1GU took fifth from Tennessee. Accuracy counts!

Multipliers

To make the top ten in multipliers this round you needed to work 54 different sections, provinces, or countries, with 6 ops tying for 10th place having that many in their logs. Kirk K4RO and Pat N9RV tied for first at 56 with 6 stations (Ken KØEU, Andy N2NT, Tor N4OGW, Trey N5KO, Dan N6MJ and Bob N6TV) tying for 3rd at 55.

A note of appreciation to the BC and VT QSO Party operators who handed out Sprint QSOs along with logging one for their home contest. Definitely a win-win situation. It's great to see the activity from so many locations — let's activate some of those "dark" multipliers next time!

Sprint Diplomacy from 4U1UN



A lot of sprinters were thoroughly surprised to hear 4U1UN making QSOs. It had been a LONG time since the contest's 4U1U record was set — 1985! Since then, the United Nations club station has been completely rebuilt to allow remote control operation since access to the old club room is no longer possible. Most of the HF operation these days is by Adrian Ciuperca, KO8SCA. He reports that, "It was fun to be in the Sprint and be able to give out a multiplier although constantly working the VFO remotely was not an easy task. But 4 hours is not that long."





"Many people were surprised to see 4U1UN in the Sprint, yet many more kept asking for the 4U1UN state....Overall, I was glad to spend 4 hours enjoying the contest. A SteppIR BigIR vertical antenna in the middle of a large (RF noisy) city makes receiving a challenge." The station's Flex 6600 helps take care of the receive and transmit chores. You can see the station's equipment rack and location of the vertical on the UN building's roof in the photos from Adrian. (Adrian is shown operating during the recent 9MØW expedition.) Sprint Hint - Optimizing that QSY

Great fun. Like root canal. Slowly getting into the rhythm. This is a contest for hyperactive people. — WA2VIU

The Special QSY Rule is really what differentiates the CW Sprint from other short contests: After calling a CQ and making a contact, you must QSY at least 1 kHz to call another station or 5 kHz to send CQ again. Reducing the time between sending that ACK after you end a CQ-initiated QSO and working your next one is key to a high rate, since you can't just sit in one spot and run.

For SO1R ops, there are at least three different fast QSY strategies in use: (1) Just spin your VFO knob at least 1 kHz after sending that ACK; (2) Set up high and low frequencies in your VFO A and VFO B band memories and swap VFOs each time; or (3) If you have a panadapter/spectrum screen (no call decoding allowed!) click on a signal or an open spot that is the required distance away.

And one other note – while we are getting better at this, please, please, please be sure you have a reasonable QSO ACK (acknowledgement message). "Dit" is not sufficient, and it creates uncertainty as to whether the exchange was copied, creating the possibility that the ditter's QSO won't be logged, resulting in a NIL penalty. Jumping on top of someone's ACK is also poor operating. **Do not send your call until you hear the ACK response so fills can be completed.** There were several complaints about this obnoxious behavior. Decaf, please!

Next Time

The next CW Sprint will take place on September 8th UTC (Saturday, September 7th, in US time zones). The event starts at 0000 UTC, and stations may operate from 0000 to 0359 UTC inclusive. If you start a QSO just before the clock ticks over to 0400, you may finish it and log it at 0359. For team registration, use the *NCJ* web page, ncjweb.com. Submit logs to cwsprint@kkn.net or use the log submission form on the *NCJ* website. Logs are due 7 days after the contest! Final scores are typically posted on the NCJ website and on the CQ-Contest reflector within 2 weeks of the contest. Conditions were very good on all three bands out here. Great to so activity pick up from the usual numbers. N5KO was way ahead of me, but then his 80m antenna may have fallen down in the storm. Congrats to N6TR for the big numbers and to ZF9CW for the rare multiplier. Only mult I think I heard but did not work was VE4. – Bob N6TV

A week ago had no working transceiver and no 40/80 antenna. Good luck and occasional good wx prevailed. Missed some "easy" mults, ME, WV, AL and SC. – Bill N6ZFO
