## Results, September 1990 North American Sprint, CW

X participation was of note during the 27th running of the North American Sprint. Two DX efforts from afar were particularly worthy: the F/N6TR operation by Larry Tyree, and the ZD8Z operation by James Neiger, N6TJ.

Tree, who is known for record-setting Sprint operations from California and Oregon, wasn't going to let living in Europe put a damper on his Sprinting activities. He stayed up late and made a superb showing with 198 QSOs. Similarly, Jim made an astounding 228 QSOs and 43 multipliers from Ascension Island for a new ZD8 record! Congratulations to both Tree and Jim for setting new continental standards.

Back home, the ZF2NE/ZF8 effort piloted by Joe Staples, W5ASP, made many people happy by handing out the Cayman Islands multiplier. Also of note was the XE2XA effort by Trey Garlough, WN4KKN/5, eclipsing the old XE standard set by K5GN in the fall of 1988

As the dust settled from the log checking. Jeff Steinman, KRØY/5, topped 132 entries. Way to go, Jeff! Jeff and his wife are in the market for a new house because they are running out of room for trophies at their present QTH. Behind Jeff were George Schultz, WØUA, and Dave Patton, WOØG.

A special note of recognition goes to Ralph Bowen, N5RZ, for his fourth-place finish. As Ralph was making his 318th QSO at 0346Z, he experienced a power blackout in his neighborhood. I hate it when that happens.

In the team competition, The Dixie Sprinters managed to pull off a victory, defeating the Southern Cal and Northern Cal teams. In fourth place was the nine-man effort by The Texas DX Society, five of whom had a slash (/) in their call signs. Perhaps having one more log from a station operating portable would have been the winning stroke for these guys.

Once again, an audit summary is provided showing how the top guys did with copying the code. Take note of the errors made by George Schultz (WØUA), Glenn Rattmann (K6NA) and John Laney (K4BAI). Very interesting.

Because of the increased DX activity, there seemed to be some confusion about scoring. The rules state:

 "A valid contact consists of a complete, correctly copied and logged two-way exchange between a North American station and another station." This means DXto-North America contacts count for QSO credit as well as the usual North Americato-North America contacts.

 "Non-North American countries do not count as multipliers.'

In summary, contacts with F/N6TR and ZD8Z count for QSO credit, but not for multiplier credit. Contacts with XE2XA and ZF2NE/ZF8 count for both QSO and multiplier credit.

CW Sprint was the first time I used it in real-time mode. I think it slowed me down just a bit in the S & P mode, but I'm getting better. It did add enjoyment and challenge to the contest.-K6LL/7. Not knowing how to get my NA software to send the serial number/report I had to resort to straight key (half of my paddle-I didn't bring my keyer-forgot it if you must know).
